

CHILI TOWN BOARD
April 10, 2024

A regular meeting of the Chili Town Board was held on April 10, 2024 at the Chili Town Hall, 3333 Chili Avenue, Rochester, New York 14624 at 7:00 p.m. The meeting was called to order by Supervisor David Dunning.

PRESENT: Councilman DeCory; Councilman Slattery, Councilwoman Sperr, Councilman Valerio and Supervisor David Dunning.

ALSO PRESENT: Dawn Forte, Supervisor's Secretary; Sandra Hewlett, Stenographer; Jared Hirt, Counsel for the Town; Virginia Ignatowski, Town Clerk; Daniel Knapp, Director of Finance; David Lindsay, Commissioner of Public Works/Highway Superintendent; Councilman Slattery, Deputy Town Supervisor; Scott Bonnewell, Insurance Counselor.

The invocation was given by Virginia Ignatowski.

The Pledge of Allegiance was cited. The fire safety exits were identified for those present.

PRESENTATIONS/ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. Brent Jensen, EFPR Group, LLP – 2023 Financial Statements

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We are going to start tonight with a presentation. Brent Jensen is here from our auditing group to kind of discuss our 2023 financials.

Take it away, Brent (Jensen).

MR. JENSEN: Okay. Thank you.

Can everyone hear me?

COUNCILMAN DECORY: Yes.

MR. JENSEN: I'm Brent Jensen. I'm a partner with EFPR Group. We're your independent auditor for your financial statements.

In front of you tonight you should have two documents from us. One of them is a small, three-page document called a "Report to the Board."

And then the actual draft -- sorry, final financial statement. Final yesterday.

So in the Report to the Board, there are a number of boilerplate disclosures that we give to you. They let you know about the audit. And if there was any issue in the audit, we would bring it out in that document. I'm not going to go point by point through everything in here. I will touch on a couple of them. But generally, you should know everything in here is boilerplate because there are no significant issues.

Along those lines your significant accounting policies are detailed in Note 1 of the financial statements and your financial statement does include certain significant estimates which any financial statement does. Among the more significant estimates you also have several large liabilities on the government-wide financial statements that are determined by actuaries and can change significantly based on certain assumptions you've made. Including amongst those are the post-employment benefits, the Length of Service Award Program and the New York State pension.

We had no difficulties accounting in terms of the audit. In fact, I would go so far as to say quite frankly, this is basically the model of our clients from what we want to see from a Finance Department. You really have an analysis performed for virtually every single account in every fund on a monthly basis throughout the entire year. That is something that is much more of a rarity than I think it necessarily should be.

So we had no adjustments, no issues, nothing to report to you at all in regard to that. And what that means to me is you're getting financial information throughout the year that you can trust and rely upon as you make decisions.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Do we get a discount for this? (Laughter.)

I'm sorry. Is there a pause? (Laughter.)

MR. JENSEN: There is a -- I will tell you your fee is lower than towns that are not performing in the same way.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Okay. You didn't answer my question. You could be a politician. (Laughter.)

MR. JENSEN: You did provide to us a letter of representation finalizing the report yesterday. As I already mentioned, there are no other matters or reportable items that I have to address with you tonight.

Within the financial statement, my plan was just to hit a few of the high points and the things that are different this year and then give you kind of a quick wrap-up of what those numbers mean to me from an analysis standpoint. If any of you have any questions at any time, please do jump right in.

So I will start us off in the front financial statements on pages 25 and 26. Although most of our work and most of the disclosures in the financial statement have to do with the

government-wide financial statement, the reality is that what you budget, based on what drives this government, is the General Fund. That's why I always want to start off here and tell you what -- how this is performing, what is different year to year and what it means for you.

So overall, your revenues were up in the General Fund and you're at about 12.4 million this year. Your taxes, both property taxes and sales taxes, were really roughly flat. Year over year. I think there was actually a slight decrease in the sales tax number.

So the things that were driving this increase year over year were first of all, the use of money and property, which is really your interest income. Governments all over have suddenly started to actually make some money on the money they have for the first time in years. It's a trend we're going to be seeing really start at the end of last year and carry through this year and should probably still see it for at least another year or two years. So that is something that has been very helpful and it offsets some of what we're seeing in terms of the sales tax really starting to flatten out. The mortgage tax going down in most places. Things like that that are trends that we see throughout the State.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Brent (Jensen), in regards to that then, when you talk about the sales tax being flat and the property tax, that means that if you have a municipality that does not do its due diligence, does not take care of the taxpayer's dollars that they collect, then they're going to be in trouble? Would that be an accurate analysis?

MR. JENSEN: I would say that's fairly accurate. I think, as you all know, the economy has had some significant inflation over the past couple of years. Within government, you also have contractual obligations to continue to raise salaries year over year.

And you have things like health insurance that is a major cost that are going up far more than any inflationary trend on average.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: So again, getting back to my point, though, is that those municipalities that don't do their due diligence, they're going to be in trouble. Whereas, you're saying Chili, the way that we have conducted business, we use the taxpayer's money as if it was our own and took care of the taxpayers?

MR. JENSEN: So what I was going toward, it is very easy to get to a point where your expense trends outpace your revenue trends and you have done a good job making sure that didn't happen.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Can you say that again?

MR. JENSEN: It's become very easy with all of these expense trends to have that trend of how fast your expenses are going exceed the trend of how fast your revenue is growing, which creates a long-term problem for governments who have only a limited ability to raise new taxes.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Correct.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Why -- you said it was a trend that the sales tax revenue is going down. But --

MR. JENSEN: I wouldn't say going down. I would say flattening.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Flattening.

Why is that happening with inflation? You would think with the cost of things being higher, that sales tax would be increasing? Because it's -- consumer spending is still high.

MR. JENSEN: I couldn't give you all of the facts behind that. I can tell you that I see the sales tax numbers in a number of towns and a number of school districts and they're generally starting to flatten. I wouldn't say they have necessarily gone in reverse everywhere, but they are flattening out. I couldn't -- I don't know all of the consumer data behind that, what drives it.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Well, is it not likely that we have reached some type of a plateau also with inflation because inflation -- the inflation has been up there for a while. Likely that we have plateaued to a certain degree. Plus, there has been some question about the sales tax distribution that's come up amongst the Supervisors over the past probably six to eight months. So -- and we're still working with the County on trying to understand some of that.

Go ahead, Dan (Knapp).

DANIEL KNAPP: Another reason that we saw an initial spike going back three, four years ago, was the State changing the sales tax rules for internet sales. Internet sales used to not be taxable if you were shipping out of state. They changed that. So now every order you buy online, whether it be Amazon or, you know, whatever you are -- you're -- you're buying -- if you're buying from New Jersey or whatever, you're paying sales tax on your internet sales. So that was a huge windfall for everybody across New York State as far as the sales tax, that that is now being collected as opposed to when brick and mortar sales were going down and internet sales were going up and that was kind of lost sales tax revenue. So it -- that's kind of evened itself out now.

MR. JENSEN: I would definitely agree that was a major thing about three years ago and probably a little lag with the enforcement trying to get everybody up to speed on that. So I think that also caused some of the steep incline over time. You're not seeing the incline you were seeing for a while.

The other major change in your General Fund was you did have two property sales this year that also increased revenue as a one-time item.

On the expenditure side, probably the single biggest change was that your debt service principal was almost \$2 million. That was really a choice you made. You had \$2 million outstanding in balance last year. You have paid a million dollars off for the year. You actually made the choice to pay off the rest and get ahead of it. So that is what really drove that change. Rest of the expenses were really pretty consistent, year over year.

So all in all, your General Fund, in spite of making that choice to pay off -- sorry --

\$2 million of a debt service principal, really -- when you were only required to pay off one, you still ended up with a positive fund change in balance of about \$3/4 million. And you have a fund balance of almost 16 million right now. That is obviously a very healthy fund balance.

If I flip back a couple pages to -- so if we look at the balance sheet of the government funds and you compare what you're looking at in terms of your cash or your fund balance to things like your liabilities, you can see it is even more healthy. Your liabilities are only \$2.2 million right now. Whereas, you have a cash of 17 million and current assets about 18 million.

If you took something at a current ratio which is a common indicator of financial health, you would be over 91, which is an extremely high ratio.

And even amongst those liabilities, the largest liability there, \$1.9 million is actually just deferred revenue. The federal funds they have given you that you haven't yet spent. So that will convert to revenue as you spend it.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: We're in the process of doing that. It is not like it is just sitting there not doing anything. There are plans. Timing. Bids. Manpower. Design and so forth.

MR. JENSEN: Yes.

So that has to be obligated by the end of this fiscal year you're now in and spent by the end of the 2026 fiscal year.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Correct.

MR. JENSEN: So overall your financial health is extremely good. It's a lot of making decisions such as paying down debt early. It's allowed you to even take a step down to even reduce your tax rate in this coming year right now.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Which we did that in four -- the last four years, I believe it was -- reduced the tax rate.

MR. JENSEN: I think pretty significant this year.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Yes. Yes.

MR. JENSEN: So overall, you have sound financial management within that General Fund and everything is going very well. I wouldn't try to change a thing in regards to that.

In terms of your government-wide financial statement --

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Please let us know what page you're going back to.

MR. JENSEN: Yeah. It would be easiest to see on pages 10 and 11 in the discussion analysis where you have that two-year picture of it. So as I mentioned before, most of the disclosures in here have to deal with items that are long-term items like your capital assets, the various long-term liabilities and actuarial estimates and things like that. All of those numbers are within this statement here. But the reality is that the most important statement is what we have already talked about in that fund side.

The major changes from the fund side here, you have capital assets of about \$50 million. That's really pretty flat. Year over year. Your additions you had this year were roughly -- the amount of the appreciation that occurred. So there is no major change in that number.

You do have about a \$3 million increase in your non-current liabilities. The reality is the majority of those non-current liabilities are those estimated actuarial numbers we talked about. You have about \$10 million in that post-employment benefits. You have another 4 1/2 for the elective service at work program. The pension program. You have another 3 1/2 in the New York State pension. Those things move significantly based on a number of different assumptions that you have no control over ultimately. So that is where most of that change is coming from.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: I think that is one issue that, you know, when Dan (Knapp) does the budget with the Supervisor and so forth, the unfunded mandates that come from -- or they do come down from New York State saying "Okay, this what you need to do." Or "This is how we're trying to budget money." With not knowing -- with the Workers' Comp insurance. The cost of the medical. We're at the mercy of them telling us what we have to pay them. We're just like a consumer like everybody else is.

And so now there is a couple of new things that I heard they're talking about passing down to municipalities, as well. One of them is -- we talked briefly about it with the Supervisors, the training for the Fire Department and the stipend that the Volunteer Fire Departments would get. So it is just trying to balance that all out, as well, and trying to have that and trying to figure out what we need.

MR. JENSEN: Yep. So as I was saying, I think everything is going very well from the financial perspective. There is not a lot more I would want to point out here. Would certainly open it up to any questions you might have.

COUNCILMAN DECORY: This is not a question. But I appreciate all of the work that you put into doing this. I just want to publicly say thank you to Dan (Knapp) for his hard work, because the comment that you made to me before the meeting was, "He makes it so easy for us to do this audit."

From a Town Board standpoint, we greatly appreciate it.

MR. JENSEN: He makes it how an audit is supposed to go. We don't see that enough.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: And he is not free to a good home. He is staying here.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Anything else?

Brent (Jensen), thank you very much. Thank you for your time for the records here and putting this all together for us. I'm sure everybody will get a chance to go through some of this over time. But again, thank you. Thank you for the brief amount of time that you had to actually spend here with us, with Dan (Knapp)'s assistance and everything that he does to help put this all together.

I think the Board should understand that Dan (Knapp) does a significant amount of work into this actual document that saves us money on the work that Brent (Jensen) and his team have to do. So it really is -- well, I -- I have read this entire thing. I read the draft entirely and I read this entirely. Actually, just yesterday when we all got it. So -- I went through some of this and there is some really remarkable stuff in here.

So I am really pleased with the audit and really pleased with our position and where we stand. So thank you.

MR. JENSEN: Thank you very much.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: And, Dan (Knapp), thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Absolutely.

At this point, a Public Forum was conducted to allow public speakers to address the Town Board. The following speaker addressed the Town Board on various subjects: Michele Wuensch. The Public Forum concluded at 7:22 p.m.

MATTERS OF THE SUPERVISOR:

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I would just like to thank our Highway DPW, Parks Crew and the Parks and Recreation people that spent the -- spent a lot -- a lot -- spent the last year or more planning for the amazing solar eclipse that we all got to experience on Monday. Still was pretty cool despite the fact that we couldn't see it. The whole experience was just pretty -- pretty amazing to watch that darkness come upon us at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and come and go. It was still pretty cool.

I know our staff put a lot of time in it. I understand we had about 350 people over at the Community Center. And so -- but we -- we had great plans for a lot of good things. We had it very, very well planned, I will say.

So had we had the crowds that were anticipated, we would have been well prepared for it. I guess fortunately in a way we didn't have to be prepared for it because everything turned out to run fairly smoothly.

Thank you to everybody involved.

David (Lindsay), thank you for the attention that your guys gave to all of it. Greatly appreciate that. It was -- it was great.

I know I'm going to forget -- oh, thank you. I know it was a long time ago.

So this morning, we were able to cut the ribbon on our new dog kennel. Our dog shelter will be used for dogs that we acquire that are strays, abandoned and so on and so forth.

It's a beautiful, beautiful new facility. It was put together very well. And a lot of people again were involved in that. I want to thank all of them for their work putting this all together. But we'll have it probably fully furnished within about a week or so and be ready to take on -- take on some animals as necessary.

But thank you again for everybody, thank you to the Board for, you know, helping to support that, the financing of that. And, Dan (Knapp), for finding us the money and, you know, David (Lindsay) for keeping an eye on it and putting it all together. So it was a great effort. Thank you.

Other than --

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Equipment update.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I can provide all of the updates you want. So the playgrounds -- I understand the Hubbard Park playground is in. The surface, however, is not. There will be a rubber surface that will be put down, but we have to wait for the weather to change for that.

I understand Davis is being worked on now. Am I right on that one, David (Lindsay)?

DAVID LINDSAY: Yes.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: They're putting that -- same will hold true for that. Weather is going to be -- will be dependent on the surface. Ballantyne is in and I think we did rubber mulch over at Ballantyne? Right?

DAVID LINDSAY: Yes.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: So I think that one is also done. Which leaves Memorial, I believe? Right? Or Upper Davis? Lower Davis? Union Station. I'm sorry.

DAVID LINDSAY: Union Station.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: That one, the equipment is all stored over at the Highway Department and ready to go. So that's good.

The fitness court -- we have gotten a bid back for that, so we have that on the agenda this evening.

So that looks like that will come along well. That equipment is all -- we had to move it out of the -- out of the Archer Road property. It is sitting in a -- in a trailer box that was donated I understand by the Fire Department, correct?

DAVID LINDSAY: Yes. Yes.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: So that we could store it in there. And something we could just hook up to our truck and pull it over to the site when needed. So again, some of that is going to be weather dependent because the surface there has to be a certain temperature -- a consistent temperature in order to put down the mats there.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: How long will it take to put it together?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: David (Lindsay), three days?

DAVID LINDSAY: Three days.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: That should all go pretty good. The parks will all be back in good shape. Any update on the parking lot on -- on Union Station? When are the plants open? Are they open now?

DAVID LINDSAY: They are open now. The -- we're planning to pave -- put the binder course down by the end -- weather depending, the end of this month, early May.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Just for anybody who sees this, it might be too late, but next week the Town will begin some work on Archer Road. There will be alternating traffic going down Archer Road from Paul Road to Ballantyne Road. That will be happening next week. Replacing a pipe, I understand.

And also anybody that may not have seen it or paid attention, the bridge, the Widener Bridge on 386 will be closing this year for a brief period while they -- while they replace that bridge. So that route will be completely closed.

All of the -- all of those parties have been -- anybody that is, you know -- made -- who might have a major impact, fire, EMS, schools have all been notified. So -- but that will be kind of a major problem for some people commuting back and forth.

Sorry, Dan (Knapp). That is your route I'm sure.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: How long is that project supposed to take?

DAVID LINDSAY: Should be done --

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Three months?

DAVID LINDSAY: Yeah. Three to four months. It should be done before school starts.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Great. Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Again, we're finalizing some of the Chil-E Fest plans. Chil-E Fest will be on Chili Avenue this year. I misspoke.

It is now going to be Chili Summer Fest. It will no longer be named Chil-E Fest. So it is no longer confusing to people that we're going to have chili provided. So that's not going to be.

So it's up on Chili Avenue. We're making the final plans for that. It sounds like it will be a nice -- nice event. We have the fireworks, bands, parade. So everything should be -- should be --

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Headliners?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I'm -- you know, I'm sorry. I'm just really excited about our headliner this year, bringing them in from Las Vegas. This is probably the first time in a long time we have brought in a major --

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Elvis?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: No, it's not Elvis. But he does some Elvis. He does some Elvis. I would say he is much better at Tim McGraw than he is Elvis, but he does some of that. But this is -- the act is Vegas McGraw. He does Tim McGraw covers and this guy looks like Tim McGraw, sounds like McGraw and acts like Tim McGraw. And he really is a phenomenal performer. It is probably one of the most entertaining shows I have seen in a long time.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: So you like it then?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I do.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: We couldn't tell.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I know. I'm looking forward to that. So thanks for prompting that.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Thank you. Thank you very much.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: That is Elvis. Not Tim.

So I think that covers it for me.

MATTERS OF THE TOWN COUNCIL:

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: I just wanted to let everyone know that this year the Gates-Chili Chamber's golf tournament will be scheduled for Friday, August 2nd at Jack's Place. Used to be Chili Country Club.

But reason I'm bringing that up tonight is that this year they have renamed the golf tournament the John Nowicki Memorial Golf Tournament in honor of John Nowicki who was a longtime member of the Town of Chili. He was on the Town Board. He was on our Planning Board. I can't even remember how many years.

But he started this golf tournament because he was on the Board of the Gates-Chili Chamber many years ago and it started as a Battle of the Burbs. And -- where they had towns pitted against each other and it evolved into the fundraising tournament that it is today which raises money for both the Chili and Gates Libraries.

But I just wanted to mention here today to let everybody know that -- if anyone is interested in attending, you can go on the Chili -- the Gates-Chili Chamber website and sign up or see me with questions.

But in honor of John (Nowicki), we are naming the tournament in his honor.

RESOLUTION #115 RE: Amended and Restated Retail Lease Agreement for Operation of Water Districts

WHEREAS, the District (Town of Chili) and the Authority entered into a Retail Lease Agreement for Operation of Water Districts and/or Benefit Areas dated January 16, 2003 (the "Current Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the District and Authority wish to amend and restate the Current Agreement to: (A) include a license to allow for the installation of radio communication equipment for use by the Town's Department of Public Works at the Chestnut Ridge Tank site, (b) agree to a new forty (40) year term; and (c) make additional changes to the Current Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Public Works/Superintendent of Highways coordinated with RadioMax and determined that locating the antenna on a Monroe County Water Authority tower located at 259 Chestnut Ridge Road (Tax ID: 133.17-1-82) was suitable and would provide the needed coverage for the operations of the Public Works and Highway Departments; and
