A regular meeting of the Chili Town Board was held on November 13, 2024 at the Chili Town Hall, 3333 Chili Avenue, Rochester, New York 14624 at 7:00 p.m. The meeting was called to order by Supervisor David Dunning.

PRESENT:

Councilman DeCory, Councilman Slattery, Councilwoman Sperr, Councilman Valerio and Supervisor Dunning.

ALSO PRESENT: Dawn Forte, Supervisor's Secretary; Sandra Hewlett, Stenographer; Jared Hirt, Counsel for the Town; Virginia Ignatowski, Town Clerk; Daniel Knapp, Director of Finance; David Lindsay, Commissioner of Public of Works/Highway Superintendent; Councilman Slattery, Deputy Town Supervisor.

The invocation was given by Virginia Ignatowski.

The Pledge of Allegiance was cited. The fire safety exits were identified for those present.

PRESENTATIONS/ANNOUNCEMENTS:

1. Jess Sudol, PE, Incentive Zoning Application for 3231, 3235, 3249 & 3253 Chili Avenue.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We are going to start out this evening with a presentation. Trevor Haut from Passero Associates is here for the incentive zoning applications for 3231, 3235, 3249 and 3253 Chili Avenue.

MR. HAUT: I brought some handouts with me tonight. Good evening, Town Board. My name is Trevor Haut, representing my client tonight, the Chili Development Group.

We're here tonight as a continuation of the incentive zoning process regarding the proposed Chili Center development project located across from Chili Paul Plaza on the corner of Old Scottsville Road and Chili Avenue.

I handed out the most up-to-date sketch plan that has Starbucks on the west side of the new Town roadway. We have been working with them to refine the design. The Starbucks/Chipolte building and the dedicated road connection are to be the first phase of the development.

The revised design helps provide 10-foot setback frontage respectfully along Chili Avenue. The buildings along the dedicated roadway titled "Main Street" will be closer to the right-of-way for that main street feeling. The intent is to attract open-air dining establishments, boutique shops and service tenants. Patios will be connected to public sidewalks for a walkable atmosphere for when one may enjoy a future Christmas parade.

48 luxury apartment units within two separate buildings are located in the far eastern section of the project with adequate fire lines and circulation provided.

56,000 square feet of commercial space will be built in phases as to not over-saturate the market. Approximately 326 parking stalls are provided.

So this is the incentive zoning process. To summarize the incentives which is the relief requested, 10-foot front building setbacks along Chili Avenue. Minimum -- well, that construction would allow along the dedicated Town road.

First-floor residential units in the proposed multi-family buildings.

Parking stall quantity relief. Approximately one stall per 400 square feet. And 1.5 stalls per unit. Building height for the three-story apartment is proposed to be approximately 48 feet tall. This will provide the gable-style, attractive roofs and the Town code apparently allows 35 feet.

Relief from the side rear yard setback requirements when abutting a roadway.

And then relief from the special use requirements for outdoor dining.

Amenity offers include improvements to Memorial Park. Specifically, at the northeast corner of Scottsville Road and Memorial Park Drive. Old Scottsville Chili Road and Memorial Park Drive, excuse

The proposed upgrades to the park include -- improved by resurfacing the existing parking lot. Replacement of the basketball courts with two pickleball courts. Providing a 40 by 20 covered pavilion and robust landscaping.

I know you guys have been digesting the plan. Obviously, we want to keep you guys up-to-date as possible and respect that 10-foot front setback along Chili Avenue. So we felt that it was worthy to, you know, bust this out and show you guys the direction it's heading.

As of today, this is a sketch plan approval and we just wanted you to have the most up-to-date

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Trevor (Haut), thank you. For the Board, ask any questions. If you would indulge, I had a couple things I would like to throw in here.

I had a conversation this morning with our Town Engineer, David Lindsay, and our Building Department Manager, talking about some of the relief that they were looking for. Originally it was zero setback. We asked the consideration be made for 10 feet in the case that the Planning Board would want to put some landscaping or add something additional up to the front of this. If it goes to the Planning Board, we didn't want to kind of tie their hands and say "Well, no. You can't because we have got zero setbacks." And this gives the Planning Board some latitude to do what they want.

A couple other things that were pointed out at that -- that Trevor (Haut) -- I wasn't able to get a hold of Jess (Sudol) or yourself when we realized this. But part of the relief that you're looking for -- a couple things that we pointed out that were pointed out is the actual specific count of parking spaces. It was recommended by both the Building Department and Superintendent of Highways that the -- actually, that the relief be more generalized and not limit necessarily -- because you -- you may be -- David (Lindsay) or Paul (Wanzenried), correct me. I think Paul (Wanzenried) was in here. Correct me if I'm mistaken.

But we were -- we would ask that perhaps the amend -- the ask for part of your relief for part of the incentive be one space for every 300 square feet versus 1 feet -- one slot for every 200 square feet. So that you're not stuck with 231 spots and you end up and you get it all built out and have you 230 which wouldn't meet necessarily the code. So we thought if you added that into your -- it would give a little bit more latitude there.

We did recognize the 10-foot setback we that talked about. And the other thing that wasn't -- no one ever caught until recently is there -- Section 543 A(1), there is a requirement that commercial buildings are required to have one off-street loading berth for the first 5,000 square feet of any one additional. So we're -- we're -- the Building Department and Superintendent of Highways believe that this is not necessarily something that these type of facilities would need a loading berth. So I would ask that you amend your ask for relief from that part of the code.

And you have already now also agreed that the sidewalk would go in on there. And I see it's on the drawing also. You managed to get that in there. So the sidewalk will be built to the culvert, not to Chili Scottsville.

And the Town would take it from the culvert to Chili Scottsville, correct, David (Lindsay)? COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Can I ask why?

DAVID LINDSAY: I thought with the discussions earlier today there -- but not necessarily crossing the creek -- that the developer was expressing willingness to extend the sidewalk from Old Scottsville Chili out to the culvert. There would be a small gap there. And then it would extend from the culvert, the other side up to their entranceway.

MR. HAUT: Yep. I think that is -

DAVID LINDSAY: The Town would handle that portion directly with the culvert and any permitting that is required for that and the culvert extension. It would be minimal work for us to do that.

MR. HAUT: Right. Right. That sounds good.

 $\hbox{COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: I'm sorry. Can you explain that again? Because this is the third drawing we have gotten. }$

And one other thing -- Ginny (Ignatowski), actually -- the Town Clerk made a good suggestion. Since we have a map, could you turn that -- maybe put it up here so the audience could possibly see it so they understand -- hold it up closer so the other people on the other side, as well -- come towards us.

Thank you. So then this way they can see.

Can you explain that one more time in regards to the sidewalk? Because right now the drawing shows it heading west on Memorial Park and heading west towards Chili -- Old Scottsville Chili Road.

Are you going to just stop -- David (Lindsay), from what you're saying -- I understand that. David (Lindsay), from what you're saying, are you talking about if they extend farther towards -- extending it farther towards the west? Or stopping it where -- where they're proposing on the drawing?

DAVID LINDSAY: I can take a look at the drawing you have.

MR. HAUT: Here you go.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: I understand, but on the old drawing it doesn't have the sidewalk going that way. So now I just heard -

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: This just happened this morning, Councilman (Slattery).

MR. HAUT: That would be part of the Memorial Park improvements, the connection from the park side and then from the project side would, you know -- would consider that an additional amenity.

DAVID LINDSAY: So the intent of that stretch is that it would be to extend it from where it terminates by the parking lot for the basketball courts, pick it up there and go east and stop just short of the creek and pick it up again on the east side of the creek and connect it into where the sidewalk comes out there. That would also be a full curb section from the -- so there would be a sidewalk curb section in there.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: But to clarify, are you talking about the Town doing that work? DAVID LINDSAY: No. The developer.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: The developer doing this work. So this is something that would have to be added to this?

MR. HAUT: Yes.

DAVID LINDSAY: We would do roughly that hatched area for the creek crossing.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Just by the creek crossing. I just wanted clarification on that. I was -- I wasn't clear when the Supervisor said it and David (Lindsay) was saying something.

MR. HAUT: Exactly. That was a great summary. Exactly as David (Dunning) said.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: That is an added amenity for us.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Correct. COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Okay.

MR. HAUT: Be happy to -

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Go ahead. I am done with what I needed to say for now. Oh, one more thing. Sorry.

I just want to thank you -- go back and thank the developer for -- for listening to our concerns. I know it was brought up as part of the last conversation when -- when you were here, presenting this and listening to what -- what our concerns were and -- and coming back to the table with addressing those concerns. So I wanted to thank you and thank the developers for -- for considering our -- our thoughts. So thank you.

MR. HAUT: It's our pleasure.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Just to piggyback on that, I appreciate that, as well. That -- that the -- I like the -- the restaurants down on Memorial Park, the patio idea there. The apartments moved over to the east side of the development. So thank you for taking that feedback.

Just a couple questions. So it looks like there is a -- other than Main Street, it looks like there is still going to be a second exit out from the parking lot onto Memorial Drive, as well.

MR. HAUT: Yes, exactly.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Okay. Now, is there going to be any other exits out of your development onto Chili Avenue or just Main Street?

MR. HAUT: The one thing with this iteration, we weren't sure where we were going to get the right out on the east side of Chili Ave. So with this design, it eliminated that and improved circulation for the Panera.

Formally, we have three separate drive-throughs and we were -- we condensed the Starbucks and Chipolte to the same building. And so now there are only two drive-throughs and that's -- we're able to space that out more along that frontage. Screening those drive-through areas with landscaping and then, you know, have those buildings a bit closer to the right-of-way than code would allow. And as we go through with the Planning Board, we'll be coordinating pedestrian connections to that sidewalk along Chili Avenue.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Okay. Thank you. And will this Main Street have streetlights down it? MR. HAUT: Yeah. It would be a public road. We would be open to doing a lighting district and doing anything that would be required for -- for that. We would be happy to provide streetlights. Definitely when we start working with the Planning Board, we'll make that a reality.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN DECORY: Trevor (Haut), when you were talking about Starbucks and Chipolte, are you saying there would be just one drive-up for -- they will share a drive-up?

MR. HAUT: Yes, similarly to -- I don't know if you guys have been out on 31 in Perinton. They have a Starbucks/Chipolte there where Starbucks has a drive-through and basically that's in a third of the building and the Chipolte kind of occupies the other two-thirds. So we would be vetting that out whether it would makes sense to have a third tenant in there or it would just be a Starbucks and Chipolte.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Getting back to the streetlights question that James (Valerio) asked, it appears that you also have the streetlights that are going to be within the parking lot area of the structures?

MR. HAUT: Those would -- there would be adequate lighting for safety and for circulation parking. Um, those styles might be more like a residential lantern, and we would be open to any style that the Town would recommend.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: The reason why I ask, I see them in there. So I'm sure the Planning Board will get to all of that, as well. Obviously, we're not the Planning Board. I don't want to get into all of that.

One question I have then, referring to Chili Avenue, there was some -- the thought or comment made in regards to the property that is to the east. There was no change and thoughts, opinions, from the owner of that little strip mall that you're aware of?

MR. HAUT: I am aware of conversations ongoing to acquire and then, you know, as this -- COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Develops, moves on?

MR. HAUT: -- there will be even more incentive to sell it.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Right.

MR. HAUT: And -

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: There is no update?

MR. HAUT: No update at this point.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: And then since this is the third revision that we have seen, Supervisor, Counsel, in regards to that, now if we walk away today by saying, yeah, we -- say -- send this to the Planning Board, the chances of a different design coming in?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: It's -

MR. HAUT: Rare at this point. We want to -

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Well, it is my understanding -- Counsel, correct me if I am wrong -- but it's my understanding that the drawing that we received that we send to the Planning Board has to be done as presented.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Okay.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: So as it relates to the apartments and the location of the apartments, they do have to be in this spot over here. They can't put them over up on Chili Avenue. They can't put them back along the Memorial Drive. It — the incentives are being offered based on the sketch and the drawings that have been presented to us.

JARED HIRT: There can be minor tweak modifications, but any substantial change would have to come back before you.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: So things have to be what they're asking for relief.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: That's correct. What they're proposing today.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Good question.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: You don't have another map in your back pocket, do you?

MR. HAUT: No. That is why we want to be transparent. We have been working with Starbucks.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Counsel has a copy, so -

MR. HAUT: We just want to give you the project.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I just want to clarify, because I thought what Councilman DeCory had asked -- I don't know if -- that I heard the answer correctly or perhaps I didn't hear the question correctly. But based on this drawing, Starbucks and Chipolte are sharing a drive-through?

MR. HAUT: The Chipolte will probably be like carry-out to parking lots. The Starbucks would be -- SUPERVISOR DUNNING: That won't have a drive-through?

MR. HAUT: No.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Oh. Thank you.

MR. HAUT: The drive-thru would be for Starbucks –

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I know it's a Planning issue, but I just want -

MR. HAUT: The Starbucks menus and then the Chipolte would be kind of like a drive-up, like fast meal, they bring it out.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Nobody is running down the sidewalk with a Chipolte bag?

MR. HAUT: Depends if they're hungry.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Chipolte, over to Starbucks to get out of –

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: On-the-ground conveyor belt or something (Laughter.)

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Are we -- are we calling this "Main Street"?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: It's what it has been referred to. There is no street name.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Who determines the street name is my question?

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Why? You want it named after you?

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: No, not at all.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Mary Sperr Way?

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: It's always Mary (Sperr)'s way. (Laughter).

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: I'm just curious.

PAUL WANZENRIED: The developer.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: The developer does name the street. They always do.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Okay.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Sometimes they ask for recommendations and things like that.

JARED HIRT: Subject to 911 approval.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: If they can hire people.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Any other questions from the Board?

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: No. I mean because just looking at it quickly, just getting this tonight and the various changes and modifications -- so the Superintendent of Highways/Building Department, obviously you have received feedback from them.

The parking that is going to get overlaid, some improvements down by the -- the little park area, have we actually looked at that, how many -- because now we're putting in the parking lot. And we're going to do some improvements to it. And so do you know how many parking spots will be able to fit in that area? Did -- did we look at that from a Town standpoint? Because pickle ball obviously is going to generate more traffic, putting in two courts. So then -- also from the aspect of having the ball fields across the street.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: And the pavilion.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: And the pavilion. So I think that is something -- granted they want to do some improvements to it -- but the potential to increase the size of it to meet our needs and to make it functional for people to park in there.

Because I know that -- when you look at what we have at Davis Park, when you come off of Paul Road on -- you know, the parking lot there and how can that -- that can get a little congested. So I just think that we should really take a look at that and make sure that what we're doing there is going to suit our resident's needs in the future.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I don't disagree. I don't know, David (Lindsay), if you -- if anybody can answer the amount of parking spaces. I don't believe the intent was to make it bigger. I believe it was to make it -- kind of resurface, improve the lot, stripe it. Those kind of things.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: That is why I'm asking about striping. Because now when you go up and actually -- you take a look at that from a functionality standpoint, can we do -- actually stripe it to meet code? Especially with ADA. And because now ADA -- the Building Department is going to know this better than I and what is required -- especially if you have a handicapped van, now that is going to take up two spots basically.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Then I would suggest we put it on the record today that this lot be improved to the point where it is striped and that it would meet -- and I would assume it would meet -- don't want to assume, but we'll make it conditioned that -- upon the parking lot improvements, that would include striping and adequate ADA accessibility to the park area.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Because basically, realistically, I don't think we're going to have enough spots -- just my personal opinion -- for what could be going on there. So that is why I think we need to look at that.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We could probably pave that whole thing and it would still not be enough for some of the events over there.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Just for pickle ball alone.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Do you know how many spots it accommodates now at its current set-up?

DAVID LINDSAY: It's not striped, so I -- so there is really no control on it at the moment.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: I wouldn't even say that amount. No.

COUNCILMAN DECORY: Closer to 20 probably.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Less than that I bet you.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We'll make it and what we send over to the Planning Board, that improvement, the incentive be -- upon those improvements that the lots will be striped and handicapped-accessible signs noted.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Mr. Lindsay, how many -- how many spots are we planning on putting over to the east?

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: By the old highway.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: By the old highway garage.

DAVID LINDSAY: I think we counted around 40 that would be going in there. We still have that project down a little bit of the way to see what happens with this project here and how they might blend together. Because I think one of the -- the exits for the parking lot was going to be tying into the access roads. We may have to refigure things a little bit to make it work.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Are there going to be -- I know the answer will be "yes" here, but I will state it on the record any ways. Like a smooth transition between our parking project and their development obviously?

DAVID LINDSAY: I think that is definitely our goal. That is kind of why we kind of paused what we're doing over there until we see what happens here. We didn't want to expend a lot of money putting a parking lot that we have to completely rip out so it could blend together well.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Any other questions from the Board? I guess I'm going to recommend that we recommend the applicant to go to the Planning Board at this time and get the Planning Board's feedback on this application. Is there anyone that feels otherwise?

COUNCILMAN DECORY: No.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: No. I'm good.

COUNCILMAN VALERIO: Just for the public, what is the next step?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: The next step is they go to the Planning Board. The Planning Board will review the sketch plan and the concept and then -- and the incentives that are being offered. They will then vet that and let the Town Board know whether they approve or disapprove of the incentives and the package that is being offered. And -- and in the case in which they -- I will say they -- if they approve and say to move forward, the next step would be the Town Board would set a Public Hearing for the incentive zoning.

We would hold a Public Hearing for the incentive and then there would be a vote on the incentive. In that order. If they decline it, it still comes back to the Town Board. The Town Board can

decide at that time whether or not they would like to still proceed with it. Or they can then say that we are not going to entertain. So we still have –

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: One -- one other question. I brought this up before I asked. And I don't know this and this would be more for the Building Department. But the -- is there a certain amount of green space that is required for a development? And if so, is it -- is it met within this proposal?

MR. HAUT: The building coverage is a 30 percent match. We're at 20 percent. In the GB District there was no green space requirements that we could find in the code. Other than that -- the building coverage.

DAVID LINDSAY: That's accurate. In our code we don't have a green space requirement. We do have a building coverage. But that's strictly for structures. Parking lots are not part of that. As part of their stormwater management, as they work through that, they will have some green space probably included for that. But certainly that could be a Planning Board item if we wanted to see more green space incorporated in this site plan to come up with at that point.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: I'm glad that point was brought up. Because in the first drawing it actually showed a pond that was on the site. Not seeing that now and the amount of runoff that you will have because of the amount of asphalt that you will have -- so I'm sure that will be looked at when it goes there.

And the green space, the reason why I asked about that, because now if you do need more green space, where are you going to get it from? What are you going to eliminate? And what are you going to have to modify? So I would appreciate the input on that. So...

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Anything else?

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Not yet, but give me a minute. (Laughter.)

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: So Trevor (Haut), I believe – COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: You better move. (Laughter.)

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I believe the Town Board agrees to send this at this point to the Planning Board for their -- to vet the application. And get on -- get on the Planning Board agenda as soon as you can, but good luck.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Thank you for working with us. Appreciate that. Our pleasure. MR. HAUT: Thank you. You have been a pleasure.

Attendance as previously noted in the 11/13/24 Chili Town Board meeting minutes.

COMMENTS OR QUESTIONS FROM THE AUDIENCE:

MR. KOHLI: Good evening. Thanks for the opportunity. I'm Raul Kohli. I'm the property owner. Hopefully you can all hear me.

I understand the Town's concern with moratorium and why they want to put it in effect. I guess my concern is what are we going to do — what are the steps that the Town is going to take in the six months of this moratorium to implement this fee schedule to ensure that we can work with the Town to develop this property? Because from the developer, our standpoint, we have listened to the Town's concerns. We have listened to the Public Works Department's concerns about the easements and the gas line. We have listened to the neighbors' concerns about the traffic. And so we have brought a project that we thought would benefit the Town.

And so our concern is, is there a plan -- just not a moratorium? So I turn it over to you and ask what is the Town's plan?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: The Town's plan at this time -- should the moratorium go through and be passed, the Town will then meet. Typically the Commissioner of Public Works, the head of the Building Department and Counsel will be involved to discuss the elements, look at the code, to see where the code changes need to be made, what needs to get done. And then those -- those then have to go through a process again similar to this incentive zoning.

Once the code is -- is -- has been revised to our satisfaction, then we will -- we set a Public Hearing. Hold a Public Hearing. And then vote on the incentives. So that -- that period of time is generally at least three months. And we're looking at -- we could look -- it is hard to say. I spoke earlier with -- with your engineering for -- the solar firm and I -- today -- and sometimes it is hard to get everybody together in a three-month period of time to get everything the way we want it and get it vetted. So it -- six months, believe it or not, is a tight schedule for us. We will do everything we can to get it done within that six months time frame. But that is the process.

MR. KOHLI: So is the concern more the fee schedule? Or we don't have a process period? SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We don't have -- no. We -- we have -- a process for code changes is nothing more than people getting together, talking about what needs to change, making those changes, reviewing them from a legal standpoint, making sure they're good and then getting it out to the public so the public understands what those code changes are. So -- so that is the process. We have the process. We have done this. We have made code changes time and time again.

MR. KOHLI: It's not that we don't have a fee schedule. It's that we don't have a code -- SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We don't have a fee schedule. We don't have a fee schedule for these applications.

MR. KOHLI: So that's the concern, that we don't have a fee schedule? SUPERVISOR DUNNING: That's correct.

Now that's not to say -- I'm sorry. That's not to say that when we start going through this code, that there are other things we see that maybe we missed the first time. Because we missed the fee schedule. So maybe -- there could be other things.

Actually, there was one thing brought up today earlier by -- by your people that mentions something, you know, about a -- an update or -- or a renewal of like a -- if you decommissioned a renewal or something, there is some language that probably needs to be put in there. What we would need to do to renew -- renew the project.

I -- and -- I don't know -- our understanding is solar panels only last so long. Right? MR. KOHLI: Correct.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: So if solar panels need to all get replaced, do we need to do something in that, a renewal process or something like that? We'll look at it. I don't know that we need it, but it is something we're going to look at, too.

MR. KOHLI: Are we going to reach out to our neighbors in the surroundings towns that have this in place? The same way -

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We'll typically go through eCode360, which is General Code, which almost every municipality in our region uses. We have the ability to go through and look at other Town's codes. And yes, sometimes plagiarizing is a lot easier than trying to reinvent the wheel.

MR. KOHLI: We can see where the mistakes were, too.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Correct. We'll look at other codes to see where -- what they have done and how they have handled it.

MR. KOHLI: So in your opinion, six months, although it is a tight window, is doable. SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Maybe.

JARED HIRT: Just to be clear, assuming this gets approved tonight, there are other people that are not present at tonight's meeting that will have involvement in reviewing this code. That -- that is the crux and the intent of a moratorium. So you're taking the people that are working or affiliated with the Town -- right -- members of the Zoning, members of the Planning Board. Right? Getting input because it's -- it is -- assuming it passes, there is an acknowledgment that the code as it sits today -- okay -- might not be sufficient. Right? There is a gap. And so that needs to be addressed and that needs to be taken

into consideration with the overall Town Comprehensive Plan. So as much as we would like -- love to give you definitive answers tonight, it is just not possible.

MR. KOHLI: I understand that and I respect that. And I appreciate your honesty. I guess as a taxpayer in the Town of Chili, I have concerns that we weren't prepared for solar. We have all this land. We have all this access. We see it going up in all of the towns around us and we're not prepared? And so -- so hold on one second. So I pay taxes on land. I listen to the Town. I listen to the neighbors. And I bring a project. And -- that -- that checks every box. And I can't move forward. And I look at the Town and I say I am disappointed because my -- I -- I turn to you to have the code. To be ready to implement this. I'm not saying you're not doing a good job. Don't take what I'm saying as that. Because you're all doing a great job. I'm saying as a developer, I'm like please, I'm asking, six months. Because I'm trying to keep everyone happy.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: I -- and as Counsel stated, I don't think we can guarantee that.

MR. KOHLI: I understand.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: We'll do our best.

MR. KOHLI: That's all I can ask.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: But I can't guarantee that is what we get.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: We can only hope that we can complete it within that time period.

MR. JOHNSON: If I may, my name is Terrell Johnson representing Solar America Energy, the developer working with Mr. Kohli. First, I would like to thank you for the sentiments regarding veterans. I'm a 33-year veteran of our Nation's armed forces. That means a lot.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Thank you for your service.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Thank you, sir.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Thank you.

MR. JOHNSON: You're welcome. I feel it is important that we, as a developer, at least leverage our experience to this process to help. We understand that this is the first project for you all, for the Town of Chili.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Very good. We had the discussion about this earlier.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: "Chili."

MR. JOHNSON: I was warned about that, so.

Our organization -- this what we do. We develop projects. Part of that process is we look at ordinances -- when we do our site review -- to identify perspective projects, we approach the clients. We look at the ordinances that exist.

And one of the things that we look at is whether or not one, they're viable and we could comply with them. And based on that assessment, we initiate the process.

This is concerning for us, as an organization, for a number of reasons. One being the investments that we have made with the local utilities, RG&E. You may not be aware, but in terms of the points of interconnection to get the project going, there is an interconnection application that has to get filed. Initial deposits have to be made. 83K for the initial 25 percent of whatever the cost is to do those upgrades to allow this energy to be taken into that facility at that point of interconnection to the local utility.

Just for the record, we have a 280K balance payment that we're issuing out this week to move this project forward. So not including the engineering that has gone into the project at this point.

Our concerns -- my leadership's concern is that you have an ordinance that is in place. We just question whether or not a six-month moratorium -- would that require a six-month moratorium to establish a fee schedule?

When I look at your -- your code and Chapter 266 Section 3, we understand the fee schedule. You need a fee schedule. You have provisions out in that code that talks about fees. We, as an organization, are prepared to -- we're prepared to make an initial deposit to set up an escrow account. Your code calls for that. Your provisions outlined in that -- in that section are typical of what we would see. Make the deposit. The deposit -- what is the deposit for? The deposit has covered the costs associated with reviewing an application. In theory, it can't be no more than that.

We're prepared to do that as it gets sorted out in order that this project can continue for Mr. Kohli.

We're prepared to sign an agreement saying that if at the end of this, you all make a decision that -- say if we make a 10,000, \$15,000 initial escrow payment or deposit to support the review of the application by your parties, that it needs to be something higher that is -- obviously within reason.

Again, these costs are supposed to be to cover the cost for your parties, whether it be consultants, engineers, to review the application. We -- we would be willing to sign and do that to keep that moving forward and to support Mr. Kohli. Our leadership is immediately prepared to do that.

As Mr. Dunning mentioned, we -- we talked earlier today. There was some issues with the initial packet that were submitted. I have got the team -- my team working on that. Across the country. Because we have personnel spread out throughout the country working for this effort. For instance, one was -- the matter of an easement. We talked at length about that.

And the -- have -- we misunderstood that that required a separate process. We were ready to take that off the table, because we can modify -- we will modify our design to come out of that easement. So that wouldn't require a separate process. There is additional land to the south where this project is planned that we will try to move to -- to get the project in.

So if that takes an easement, any easement concern is off the table. So no fee schedule. No -- or no easement issue.

We will address and get compliant with whatever the ordinance says in terms of stand-off distances. A concern was brought up with the -- the Planning Board member and we -- we'll address that. That is part of the normal process. But in terms of the -- the fee schedule, which seems to be driving this process, we have experience in that. We're willing to help. We -- we make that offer to help - help this process. And we just question whether the moratorium of six months is -- is really necessary.

We -- we have looked at your ordinance and we worked with a lot of authorities having jurisdiction. And so we -- this is our business. This is our livelihood. And they range from great where they absolutely should be standing down because they don't have a number of provisions in their ordinance.

We typically will see a moratorium when a State or another governmental entity decides that they want to move forward with solar projects or wind projects and they decide who the AHJs, the authorities having jurisdictions will be, and they are not ready for it. And so to stop developers like us from bombarding them with calls and everything, they issue a moratorium to allow themselves to develop that ordinance.

You didn't -- you have an ordinance. You guys have everything -- you have a very good ordinance. You don't have your fee schedule. Okay. We understand that.

Does that require six months? When the heart of it is your -- your ordinance. And we understand we're the first case for you. And we believe in being good neighbors with any jurisdiction that we work with and we're prepared to do that, offer our expertise and our support, whether it be sample -- sample schedules, fee schedules or whatever the case may be.

We want to be good partners wherever we operate. And I give you my word as a developer on this project, my word as an officer and a gentleman. I'm a retired Lieutenant Colonel. Integrity means everything to us. That's what we're prepared to do. And so we would ask that if -- if nothing else, being that this is the first project, being that we have got an application in, we have made significant investment on this project already with pending hundreds of thousands of dollars out the door and about to go out of the door -- because they're due next week to get the utility upgrades going -- we ask in the spirit of vested rights, that this project be allowed to continue as you develop that and we work with you all to develop what you feel is missing and we make an initial deposit that we think is -- can help get your costs going. If you need us to increase that costs because you think it's a little more, then we're prepared to do that. You have that in your Chapter 266 regarding how to do that. Payments go to the Clerk. We're prepared to do that. Because that is basically blocking the process for us in these matters. That's what I would like to say.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Thank you. Just for the Town Board and my conversations with the Building Department, the application originally for quite some time was not complete. The Building Department did correspond back with the applicant to let them know these are the specific things that were missing in their application. One of which is -- was the fee. And application is not deemed complete until the fees are paid. And that -- then they get put on to the Planning Board application, accepted and they're put on the Planning Board.

I see -- so Mr. Wanzenried is here so I will ask him a question.

Did the SWPPP get submitted?

PAUL WANZENRIED: Not as of yet.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: So along with the fees, the SWPPP has not been submitted either. So this project is still incomplete as of this moment. We have not gotten all of the things. So it is not a complete application. And they're not deemed complete until fees and all of the documents requested are turned in.

Some of the documents that were missing or some of the information has been submitted. So this application is not complete. So there is no vested right in this particular project at this point in time.

Our meeting earlier today, we had a discussion -- the same thing was brought up. We are the stewards for the people. We represent the Town of Chili. We represent the people of the Town of Chili. That's our business. And -- and we take this very seriously. Having our code up-to-date, whether it seems -- and you may experience and have been dealt with hundreds and hundreds of other municipalities who have beautiful codes and some who don't have beautiful codes. This is still Chili's code and it's under our purview to make sure that this code is done correctly and up-to-date and current.

At this time, I -- as I mentioned to you earlier, I don't know if we could even legally do it, but I'm not even interested -- personally, I'm not interested in trying to do something here with some fees in escrow and not knowing what the fees are going to be so that you can keep the project moving forward.

I would like us to be able to do our work and do our due diligence and make sure the application -- and make sure the Town has everything it wants and needs in its code at this point in time.

So we'll leave it at that. Anyone else wishing to speak at the Public Hearing?

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Supervisor, just one question for you? There was a comment made about the life of these type of facilities and, you know -- after a while, they are no longer productive.

From past history then, I would say what -- what is that time frame? And then what is done once they get to that point? What happens with that property?

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: It's my understanding, somewhere in that 25- to 30-year time frame that a -- that a -- it may be a little longer. But my understanding and conversation -- even when -- so if a panel goes -- or two or three or four, five, whatever go bad, a lot of times they just simply replace the panel with another panel and keep going as long as the project is still a viable project for -- for what they're doing. So they would just replace panels as they go along.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Okay. All right. And then I highly respect and appreciate your service to our country. That is something that I strongly believe in and so forth. If you look at my history, you will know why.

But I also know that people come and go, as well. So I may be sitting up here today. May be gone tomorrow. The same with other positions. So your word is very important to you as well as myself. And I just want to say that unfortunately, we may not be there tomorrow and then maybe somebody else who doesn't have that same commitment. So I understand and respect that. So that -- I just want to mention that.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Anything else from anybody?

JARED HIRT: Just to clarify, to piggyback on Councilman Slattery's comments, that is sort of the intent and purpose of a moratorium. You asked a question regarding the life expectancy and some of the issues that perhaps maybe were overlooked when the -- when the code was initially passed and the effect it may have on the community and the health, safety and wellbeing of the constituents. That's the intent behind a moratorium, is to allow sufficient due diligence –

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Correct.

JARED HIRT: -- to look into all of those issues. And to be clear, although the lack of a fee schedule may be what predicated this or precipitated this, the moratorium itself is not limited to just the review of the fee schedule. The moratorium is you, as a Board, and whoever the Town brings into the fold to review this, it -- is capable of looking at the code and if they want to leave it, they can leave it. If they want to make modifications, amendment revisions to it based upon the due diligence, based on what they believe is in the best interest of the Town and constituents, they can do that. I just want to make that point.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Thank you for that.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Anybody else? Anything? Moving right along -- anyone else want to speak at the Public Hearing? I will declare the Public Hearing closed.

The Public Hearing was closed at 7:49 p.m.

At this point, a Public Forum was conducted to allow public speakers to address the Town Board. No speakers addressed the Town Board. The Public Forum concluded at 7:50 p.m.

MATTERS OF THE SUPERVISOR:

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: First thing I would like to do is thank Mr. Lindsay, his staff, Mr. Curley, his staff, all of you who came out to help in our Veterans' Day celebration, the breakfast and dedication of our new memorial last Saturday. We had an absolutely perfect day for that. It was a great breakfast. It was a great dedication, I think, to that new memorial.

The Commander over at the -- at American Legion actually broke down in tears when she saw that memorial and what we put together. So one, thank you to the Board, Mr. Lindsay, your people for helping us get this -- that memorial put together as well as thanks for your help that day. All your crews that came out to help us make that a beautiful event. So thank you all for that.

I don't know how many of you watch Channel 13 News, but at 6 o'clock this evening, there was a nice little piece on Channel 13 about the Chain Gang at the Senior Center. If you don't know what the Chain Gang is, the Chain Gang is a group of women who go out and knit -- apparently the first row of a crocheted item is called a "chain." So they call themselves the Chain Gang.

So they went to a charter school and had the kids make a drawing of a hat that they would like -- a winter hat that they would like and the kids drew these hats. And gave -- and gave those -- they didn't know what was happening. The School gave the drawings to the Chain Gang, because the Chain Gang wanted to this. They made custom hats for each one of the kids and then today, presented it to those kids over at the school. The kids were like -- I can't remember the name of the school -- I'm sorry. I -- I --

it was -- it was one of the charter schools. It will be online on Channel 13. Check it out. It was really, really great.

But it is nice to see a lot of the good stuff that happens here in the Town of Chili and the good-hearted people who -- who live here, work here, play here and the things that they offer up to -- to the rest of the community. To see the kids' faces when they got their hats was pretty cool. So I encourage you to check it out online and look at that.

And thank you to the Chain Gang for their work in that and making that happen. So -- so ladies, if you do get to see this Town Board meeting at some point or someone shows it to you, thank you. We appreciate what you do.

COUNCILMAN DECORY: The Renaissance Academy Charter School of the Arts.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Thank you.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Where is that located? Do you know?

COUNCILMAN DECORY: I don't have the address. You're asking me too much. (Laughter.)

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: But outside of the Town of Chili community?

COUNCILMAN DECORY: Correct.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Also, coming up, before our next Town Board -- December 7th, I believe, is the tree lighting.

COUNCILMAN DECORY: 6th. COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: 6th.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: 7th is the breakfast. I'm sorry. So the tree lighting is December 6th. On December 7th is our Breakfast with Santa. I always look forward to that event. Always a lot of fun. A good time. Once again, it is going to have the very large craft fair there. I think the entire Community Center was -- was consumed by crafters and really, really nice stuff, too. So it was -- it wasn't your -- your junk at all. It was really, really nice. That -- that was -- worked with Brasser. We worked with the Brasser organization to put that on. That was really good.

So other than that, I don't believe I have anything else.

MATTERS OF THE TOWN COUNCIL:

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: I do. Last October 23rd, the Chamber of Commerce held their Annual Community Awards Gala. And I just want to thank everyone here for your -- you here for your participation in that.

Michael (Slattery) presented our -- our Lisa Martin Outstanding Citizen Award to Otto Harnischfeger. And if you don't know Otto (Harnischfeger), you ought to know Otto (Harnischfeger). He is just a fantastic individual. He is the President of the Pirate Toy Fund?

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: Executive Director.

COUNCILWOMAN SPERR: Executive Director of the Pirate Toy Fund.

And David (Dunning) always every year presents our Civic Beautification Award. And that went to John Gizzi and the Gizzi Family for the brick home that was refurbished right at the intersection of Union Street and the on-ramp for 490. It used to be hidden behind all kinds of brush and they just really brought it back to life.

Those are just a couple of the examples of awards, but I just want to thank everyone for their involvement. We had 147 people that came to the dinner to congratulate everyone who won.

One of the other -- I should mention one of the winners was Arlene Nanry. And Arlene (Nanry) is the one that had the idea to start a comfort care home on the west side because there are not enough of them around. And Arlene (Nanry) put together a group of people that have been fundraising since and they have been working on it for about ten years. And they're almost ready to open up. And so she won our Woman's Leadership Award which was named after Loretta Simmons, the first woman President of the Chamber 50 years ago.

But I just want to thank everyone for their participation and support. It's a great thing for our community.

COUNCILMAN SLATTERY: David (Dunning), also, just -- to touch on before the -- if you haven't seen the new memorial that is up at the Community Center, I would highly recommend that you do. It is very special and very touching and just well deserved for our brave men and women that have served our country.

And but before that, the Town of Chili, because of our deep respect and honor that we have for the men and women that serve our country, we also -- Barbara -- I will not mention her last name -- but great people. She also started a donation drive to send items to our troops that will go overseas, small little packets. Whether it's cleaners, hand wipes that -- you know, there was a number -- I can't tell you the number of pieces that were donated to them.

But Mary (Sperr) just mentioned Otto Harnischfeger, the Executive Director of the Pirate Toy Fund. They -- I'm also involved with them, as well, and they donated ChapStick, puzzles, little games or little different things that men and women serving overseas, you know -- the conditions that they may

be serving in may not be -- have access to WiFi -- unless you're a certain branch of the military and then you stay at a Best Western. Just kidding about the Air Force.

But the items that were donated was just amazing and truly special. And they put a bunch of people together to pack these items up and then they will be shipped out.

And then there is also another event that is coming up, just after Thanksgiving -- is Trees for Troops. They -- you know, the different legions get together. We go out to Stokoe Farms and then -- Stokoe is great. And you can make a donation to Stokoe if you want. You can make a donation to Stokoe if you want, make a donation towards a tree.

And then FedEx comes out with a tractor-trailer and we load all these trees into a tractor-trailer. In the past it has been two tractor trailers. And then they will mail these trees to various locations, bases for the -- for the men and women that will not be home celebrating the holidays with their families. So I just want to mention those, as well.

SUPERVISOR DUNNING: Excellent. Anything else? All right.

2025 PROPOSED BUDGET – TOWN OF CHILI 43% REDUCTION IN TAX RATE Submitted by David J Dunning, Town Supervisor

As is the case nationwide, the effects of inflation continue to impact the Town. We have developed the 2025 budget expecting to see significant continued burden to the Town in certain key areas, such as utilities, equipment and benefits. While our costs continue to rise, revenues are relatively flat.

This 2025 budget proposal addresses our needs while remaining fiscally responsible. Throughout the budget process, we continued to control spending, making increases where necessary and reductions where possible. As a result of our efforts, there is a significant decrease to the proposed Town tax rate in 2025, and the budget remains well below the 2% tax cap. My proposed 2025 budget reflects a Town tax rate of \$1.83, down from the 2024 rate of \$2.62! The low tax rate is a direct result of controlled spending and achieving a 100% assessment valuation. While slightly higher than the 2024 tax levy, the proposed 2025 tax levy is at a 10 year low. Both new commercial and residential investments in our community have made a significant impact on the growth of our assessed valuation.

My proposed 2025 budget is centered on retaining and where appropriate improving on the services our residents have come to expect. The 2025 budget is focused on essential community needs, employee retention, and future financial security. I felt it especially important to present a very conservative budget during a time that many in our community continue to face their own financial challenges.

The Town has used a significant amount of the funding through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) to fund aging facility needs, park improvements, community wellness and a new Veterans Memorial. This funding has provided the Town an opportunity to invest in much needed projects without burdening our residents with more local taxes.

As proposed the 2025 budget continues to maintain healthy reserves for future needs, funding for aging equipment and several community projects.

The 2025 budget invests in our employees and their benefits. This is a significant investment into the hard working staff that provide the services our residents have come to enjoy and expect. They plow your roads, pick up leaves and debris, process permits allowing for growth, and operate your Community Center and Court, among many, many other tasks.

I am happy to present this 2025 budget which maintains services, addresses the needs of our community, provides fiscal responsibility and reflects a decrease in the Town tax rate.

WHEREAS, at a meeting of the Chili Town Board held at the Town Hall in the Town of Chili, New York on the 13th day of November, 2024 a public hearing was held at 7:00 p.m. to consider the adoption of a proposed Local Law #4 of the year 2024 to the Town Code of the Town of Chili, for a Six-Month Moratorium on Tier 3 Solar Energy System Approvals and discussion upon the matter having been had and all persons desiring to be heard having been duly heard; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, upon the evidence obtained by the Town Board at said public hearing and upon all other information obtained and reviewed by the Board; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Local Law #4 of 2024 is hereby enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Chili.

SECTION 1. TITLE.

This Local Law shall be known as the "Moratorium on and Prohibition of Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems Within the Town of Chili."

SECTION 2. STATUTORY AUTHORITY; PURPOSE AND INTENT.

This Local Law is intended to be consistent with and is adopted pursuant to the authority granted to the Town Board of the Town of Chili under the New York State Constitution, and the Laws of the State of New York, including, but not limited to, the following authorities: New York State Constitution Article IX, Municipal Home Rule Law, Statute of Local Governments, Town Law, Environmental Conservation Law, and 6 NYCRR Part 617. This Local Law is a land use regulation. This Local Law is intended and is hereby declared to address matters of local concern, and it is declared that it is not the intention of the Town to address matters of statewide concern. This Local Law is intended to act as and is hereby declared to exercise the permissive "incidental control" of a zoning law and land use law that is concerned with the broad area of land use planning and the physical use of land and property within the Town, including the physical externalities associated with certain land uses, such as potential negative impacts of such uses on a community.

This Local Law shall supersede and suspend those provisions of the zoning ordinance(s) and laws of the Town of Chili which require the Planning Board and/or the Town Building Department to accept, process, and approve land use applications for all Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems.

This Local Law is intended to temporarily prohibit the creation or siting of Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems within the Town of Chili for a period of up to six (6) months, pending the development, modification, and adoption of local laws and/or ordinances designed to regulate and govern such Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems.

The Town Board recognizes and acknowledges that the Town needs to study and analyze many considerations that affect the preparation of local legislation to regulate the future creation and siting of Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems. The Town Board has formally requested the Building Department and the Planning and Zoning Boards of the Town of Chili to identify and review local laws from other jurisdictions, and related information and source materials, in order to assist in modifying and/or developing the parameters of a local law to regulate Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems. The Town Board has directed the Assistant Town Attorney to assist in this endeavor.

The Town Board also recognizes the need to review and examine its existing ordinances, local laws and zoning ordinance(s) insofar as they may be affected by adoption of such local law(s) regulating the creation and/or siting of Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems. It is deemed necessary to enact this moratorium in order to permit the Town adequate time in which to draft suitable legislation for this purpose. During the term of the moratorium the Town of Chili shall work to prepare and eventually adopt new and/or modified land use regulations to incorporate into the Town's existing zoning ordinance(s).

During the pendency of the moratorium, the Town Board will consider how best to permit Tier 3 Solar Energy Systems so as to harmoniously integrate such Systems with the existing agricultural community and landscape. At present, the zoning ordinance(s) of the Town of Chili may not adequately regulate such land use. If the community allows such development during that time, the goals of the Town Comprehensive Plan and its related legislation favoring the successful continuity of agricultural operations could be undermined or damaged. Moratoria are useful in controlling or temporarily inhibiting development until satisfactory final regulations are adopted.

For these reasons, the Town Board finds that temporary moratorium legislation is both advisable and necessary for a reasonable and defined period of time in order to develop and adopt necessary zoning and land use changes to the zoning ordinance(s) of the Town of Chili, thus protecting and furthering the public interest, health and safety.

SECTION 3. DEFINITIONS.

For purposes of this Local Law, the following terms shall have the meanings respectively set forth below:

Solar Energy System – The components and subsystems required to convert solar energy into electric energy suitable for use. The term includes, but is not limited to, solar panels and solar energy equipment. The area of a solar energy system includes all the land inside the perimeter of the solar energy system, which extends to any interconnection equipment. A solar energy system is classified as either a Tier 1, Tier 2, or Tier 3 solar energy system as follows:

- A. Tier 1 solar energy systems are defined as the following:
 - (1) Roof-mounted solar energy systems.
 - (2) Building-integrated solar energy systems.
- B. Tier 2 solar energy systems are ground-mounted solar energy systems with system capacity up to 25 kW AC, a total surface area of all solar panels on the lot of up to 1,600 square feet and that generate no more 110% of the electricity consumed on the site over the previous 12 months.
- C. Tier 3 solar energy systems are those solar energy systems which are not Tier 1, Tier 2, or Tier 4 solar energy systems.
- D. Tier 4 solar energy systems are those solar energy systems producing 25 MW or more. Tier 4 solar energy systems are subject to permitting by the Board of Electric Generation Siting and the Environment ("Siting Board") under Article 10 of the New York State Public Service Law.

SECTION 4. TEMPORARY MORATORIUM AND PROHIBITION.

Unless permitted pursuant to Section 5 hereafter, from and after the date of this Local Law, no application for a permit, zoning permit, special permit, zoning variance, building permit, operating permit, site plan approval, subdivision approval, certificate of occupancy, certificate of compliance, temporary certificate, or other Town-level approval of any nature shall be accepted, processed, entertained, approved, approved conditionally, or issued by any board, employee, official or agent of the Town of Chili, for the construction, modification, establishment, or use or operation of any land, body of water, building, or other structure located within the Town of Chili, for any Tier 3 Solar Energy System, as defined above. Unless permitted pursuant to Section 5 hereafter, from and after the date of this Local Law, no person shall use, cause, or permit to be used, any land, body of water, building, or other structure located within the Town of Chili for any Tier 3 Solar Energy System, as defined above.

This moratorium and prohibition shall be in effect beginning on the effective date of this Local Law and shall expire on the earlier of (i) that date which is six (6) months after said effective date; or (ii) the effective date of a Town Board resolution affirmatively stating the Town Board has determined that the need for this moratorium and prohibition no longer exists.

This moratorium and prohibition shall apply to all real property within the Town of Chili, and all land use applications for the siting or creation of a Tier 3 Solar Energy System within the Town of Chili.

Under no circumstances shall the failure of the Town Board of the Town of Chili, the Zoning Board of Appeals of the Town of Chili, the Planning Board of the Town of Chili, or the Code Enforcement Officer for the Town of Chili to take any action upon any application relative to a Tier 3 Solar Energy System for a permit, zoning permit, special permit, zoning variance, building permit, operating permit, site plan approval, subdivision approval, certificate of occupancy, certificate of compliance, temporary certificate, or other Town-level approval constitute an approval by default or an approval by virtue of expiration of time to respond to such application.

SECTION 5. HARDSHIP VARIANCE RELIEF FROM APPLICABILITY OF MORATORIUM. Applications for land use otherwise subject to this moratorium may be exempted from the provisions of this Local Law following a noticed public hearing before the Town Board, at which hearing the Town Board may consider:

The proximity of applicant's premises or the subject of applicant's request for relief to natural resources, including, but not limited to, prime agricultural soils, wetland areas, conservation districts and other environmental concerns.

The impact of the proposed application on the applicant's premises and upon the surrounding area.

Compatibility of the proposed application with the existing land use and character of the area in general proximity to the subject of the application, and its effect upon aesthetic resources of the community.

Compatibility of the proposed application with the recommendations of any administrative body charged with such review by the Town of Chili.

The written opinion of the Town of Chili Planning Board and the Town of Chili Code Enforcement Officer that such application may be jeopardized or made impractical by waiting until the moratorium is expired.

Such other reasonable considerations and issues as may be raised by the Town Board.

In making a determination concerning a proposed exemption or grant of relief from application of the moratorium, the Town Board may obtain and consider reports and information from any source it deems to be consistent with review of said application. A grant of relief from application of the moratorium shall include a determination of unreasonable hardship upon the property owner which is unique to the property owner, and a finding that the grant of an exemption will be in harmony with, and will be consistent with the recommendations of the Comprehensive Plan.

An application for relief of application of the moratorium shall be accompanied by a fee of \$500.00, together with the applicant's written undertaking, in a form to be approved by the Attorney for the Town, to pay all of the expenses of the Town Board and any agent or consultant retained by the Town Board to evaluate and consider the merits of such application, including but not limited to any fees incurred by the Town for services provided by the Attorney for the Town.

SECTION 6. PENALTIES.

Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Local Law shall be punishable by a fine of not more than One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) for the first offense. Any subsequent offense within a three-month period shall be punishable by a fine of not more than Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00). For purposes of this Section, each day that a violation of this Local Law exists shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Compliance with this Local Law may also be compelled and violations restrained by order or by injunction of a Court of competent jurisdiction, in an action brought on behalf of the Town by the Town Board.

In the event the Town is required to take legal action to enforce this Local Law, the violator will be responsible for any and all costs incurred by the Town relative thereto, including attorney's fees, and such amount shall be determined and assessed by the Court. If such expense is not paid in full within 30 days from the date it is determined and assessed by the Court, such expense shall be charged to the property within the Town on which the violation occurred, by including such expense in the next annual Town tax levy against such property, and such expense shall be a lien upon such property until paid.

SECTION 7. CONFLICTS.

For and during the stated term of this Local Law, unless the stated term thereof shall be modified or abridged by the Town Board, this moratorium shall take precedence over and shall control over any contradictory local law, ordinance, regulation or code provision.

SECTION 8. SEVERABILITY.

If any word, phrase, sentence, part, section, subsection, or other portion of this Local Law, or the application thereof to any person or to any circumstance, is adjudged or declared invalid or unenforceable by a Court or other tribunal of competent jurisdiction, then, and in such event, such judgment or declaration shall be confined in its interpretation and operation only to the provision of this Local Law that is directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or declaration is rendered, and such judgment or declaration of invalidity or unenforceability shall not affect or impair the validity or enforceability of the remainder of this Local Law or the application hereof to any other persons or circumstances. If necessary as to such person or circumstances, such invalid or unenforceable provision shall be deemed severed, and the Town Board of the Town hereby declares that it would have enacted this Local Law, or the remainder thereof, even if, as to particular provisions and persons or circumstances, a portion hereof is severed or declared invalid or unenforceable.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.

The effective date of this Local Law shall be immediately upon its filing with the Secretary of State.
